The Friends of Alaska National Wildlife Refuges and Alaska Maritime National Wildlife Refuge welcome the migratory shorebirds and YOU back to Alaska's largest wildlife viewing event, the 31st annual Kachemak Bay Shorebird Festival, held May 3-7, 2023.

This year's program promises to offer an amazing array of events to celebrate the spring migration of Alaska's shorebirds.

Kachemak Bay, located in Homer, Alaska, provides miles of shoreline and intertidal habitat for migrating birds. Kachemak Bay's unique ecology, easy accessibility to beaches, and the scenic landscapes of Homer make this a prime location to experience this annual migration. Kachemak Bay is a site of International Significance in the Western Hemisphere Shorebird Reserve Network. During the 2022 Festival, 134 species were identified.

This year's Festival Artist, Mattie Squire, created our beautiful artwork which features the mysterious Kittletz's Murrelet. We welcome our Keynote Speaker Diego Calderón-Franco and featured Author Julia Zarankin. We hope you'll also enjoy presentations from the 2023 Schantz Scholar, Oscar Wilhelmy, along with tours and talks by knowledgeable Alaska birders and researchers. The Center for Alaskan Coastal Studies and the Pratt Museum and Park are key program partners and will offer education and fun activities throughout the festival.

The Festival is continuing to expand its events to reach a wider demographic through programs such as the All Abilities Birding Outing and the Teen Birder activities. We invite people of all ages and abilities to join us for guided birding excursions, wildlife viewing, and kayaking tours at locations around Kachemak Bay.

It takes an entire community to successfully sponsor more than 30 years of conservation education. The Kachemak Bay Shorebird Festival could not happen without the dedication of Homer's businesses, countless volunteers, sponsors, and enthusiastic attendees.






The Wise and Wonderful Journey

Visit Gull Island for up-close viewing opportunities of horned and tufted puffins, pigeon guillemots, cormorants, kittiwake and murres. The cruise continues along the coast; nesting eagles, loons, kingfishers, sea ducks and many other species are common sightings. The journey passes ocean upwellings and tide streaks that bring nutrients and food to the surface, locations ideal for foraging birds such as Aleutian terns, red necked phalaropes, murrelets, sea ducks and other wildlife. The rich biodiversity of Kachemak Bay supports many marine mammals, and seals, otters and porpoises are common sightings. Encounters of Steller sea lions, humpback and orca whales are not unusual. Birding Hot Spots - Anchor River 💏

8:30 a.m.-12:30 p.m. | AMNWR visitor center, meet in parking lot

Hop on the bus with guide Aaron Lang to discover the hottest birding spots along the Anchor River. Seabirds, songbirds, shorebirds, water birds, raptors and more! Join our experienced guides for a 2.5 mile walk along the beach and Anchor River to its mouth. There's the potential to see rarities like bristle-thighed curlew, glaucous gulls or horned lark. More common are whimbrels, yellowlegs, scoters, loons, guillemots, mergansers, "peeps," harlequin ducks, and murrelets. Wear sturdy shoes or hiking boots to walk in the sand. Dress in layers and take water. A limited number of scopes will be available. Limit 22. \$40pp.

Cookies, Coffee, and Songbird Walkabout

Come aboard the heated This fully guided tour cruises to Gull Island for up-close viewing Orca landing craft with Captain Curt and his ROV to marvel at these agile animals. 



Insights after 14 Years of Kachemak Bay Shorebird Monitoring 🕢 📤

Join George Matz, a local bird expert who has organized the Kachemak Bay Shorebird Monitoring Citizen Science Project, to learn what information has been found about the migration of shorebirds through the area. The long-term objective for this citizen science project is to attain a better understanding of the status of shorebird populations in Kachemak Bay as well as the intertidal areas of the Anchor and Kasilof Rivers, particularly during spring migration. Also, volunteer participation provides local birders with more opportunity to observe and enjoy shorebirds. SPRING SIGHTINGS

KACHEMAK BAY BIRDERS



Kachemak Bay is home not only to the spring shorebird migration, but also many other hard-to-find bird species as well. Early May brings the first warblers and swallows to Homer, along with sandhill cranes, Arctic and Aleutian terns, fork-tailed storm-petrels and puffins, both tufted and horned. Cormorants, common murres and black-legged kittiwakes can be found near their nesting sites on Gull Island, and common eider, pigeon guillemot, marbled and Kittlitz's murrelets are visible on Kachemak Bay.

Look for Eurasian wigeons in Mud Bay and Beluga Lake. Find American three-toed and hairy woodpeckers in the spruce wood areas. The southside of Kachemak Bay's northern temperate coastal rainforest attracts different species from the drier north shore and boreal forest. Though not a shorebird, the bald eagle can be spotted frequently on shore and in the sky. Many of the 236 species of birds recorded for Kachemak Bay may be visible during Shorebird Festival weekend.







Advice from a Bird: Be aware of the tides.

Tides in Alaska can be extreme at times. The best time to spot shorebirds is just after high tide. High tide signals roosting time for most shorebirds. With their feeding grounds flooded, the birds settle into tidal marsh areas, beaches, and along rocky shorelines The high water deposits a new batch of pickings for the shorebirds twice a day. As the tide retreats, the saturated sand in the shallows becomes loose. The loose sand is easy for the birds to probe for fresh prey with their sensitive beaks. As the tide starts to move back out, so too will the birds, well rested and once again looking to feed. Now, instead of the birds being pushed towards you with the incoming tide, you are following them as they fan out along the beach.

Shorebirds typically have relatively longer legs to allow their bodies to remain dry as they wade. Their toes are also longer to provide a larger footprint. This helps to prevent them from sinking into the soft mud and sand where they hunt. Many have longer beaks allowing them to penetrate deeper into the floor in search of a tasty morsel.

The silt and mud of the shallow waters is where the birds wade and sift the bed for food. Mollusks, worms, invertebrates, and other crustaceans make up the shorebird's staple diet.

Pick your spot, get low, and move only when necessary. And be careful not to get so caught up in these wonderful birds that you forget where the water is. Be mindful as the water flows in and out; the last thing you want to do is get your camera wet.

Keep in mind, that as fun and rewarding as it is to capture a great photo or check off one of your top 5, the health and safety of the birds is paramount. Protect the birds and their homes, and they'll be around to visit for years to come.




